This book is designed to cover one year's work in Hebrew leading up to a full understanding of the language. It has been used by the author with his students for many years and the published text is the result of testing and refining over these years. Every attempt has been made to make the grammar clear and simple. For example, all Hebrew words are transliterated, as well as being given in the original for the first three-quarters of the book. The grammatical discussion is made as unsophisticated as possible for it is the author's intention that this book should also be of use to those who study Hebrew without a teacher.

A mixture of scripture, piety and magic forming a series of prayers/supplications for protection, mostly from evil tongues. It is personalised in that the text specifically asks for protection for a particular named person, and was probably written by its first owner who is likely to have been a monk, as his name was Gabremariam, which translates as 'servant of Mary'. Later owners have tried to obliterate that name, and have added their own (the first is Mekonen, the second Welde Teklehaimanot). The original owner's name appears twice, once at the start and once at the end. The background of the original owner/scribe was Amharic, as is shown by the slight deviations from pure Geez (Ethiopic language) by some spelling changes. The summary/introduction on the first page reads (roughly): "In the name of the Father and the Son and the holy Spirit, one God Prayer against the human tongue, enemy people with mal-intention [evil intent?], those who practice black magic, those who cast their shadow on you [this was a threatening practice], and hysteria Save your servant [personal name inserted here]". Then there are the individual supplications. Each of the supplications calls on an aspect of God, or of Christ's life, and after the supplications there is a short treatise on the evil power of the human tongue, then praise for God and a prayer for protection from death. The text mentions a Biblical letter by the apostle James on the power of the tongue. The power of the tongue is very strongly emphasised - blessings and curses, peace and hatred. The rubrication (red lettering in the text) indicates any one of a number of important parts of the text, including the start of a new supplication, and the name of Christ. The book probably dates from the late nineteenth century, possible the 1880s, and although it would have been extremely important to its original owners, as time has passed and beliefs have changed, a lot of such books would have been sold. -- Information provided by researcher who has studied comparative religion and reads Geez fluently.

Ge'ez is an ancient Ethiopian language which is still important for the liturgy of the Orthodox church. The dictionary is arranged in the order of the Ge'ez syllabary. All the basic as well as the derived forms are presented in the Ge'ez alphabet and in phonetic transcription. The transcription should be helpful in indicating the correct pronunciation of the entries. The dictionary includes nearly all the entries that are considered essential for students of Ge'ez.
