Graduate School Paper Format The graduate school essay, as well as the recommendation letter, GPA (grade point average), the personal statement, and GRE scores, is an essential part of every application process in the high school. Its main goal is to collect information about the applicant that will help in the decision-making process.

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The first page of the body of your paper—introduction or first chapter/section—should be Arabic-numbered page 1. In Word, use section breaks where you want to change page numbering style and restart numbering. All body text and back matter page numbers should be Arabic numerals (1, 2, 3, etc.) continued from the previous section of your paper. Please do not start each new chapter with page 1.

Format | Graduate School

To be cogent, your paper needs three parts: an introduction, body, and conclusion. The introduction presents the topic that you'll discuss and (potentially) previews the conclusion. The body contains all of your supporting ideas and arguments. And the conclusion summarizes your ideas and offers further reflections.
