The Chams or Cham people, are an ethnic group of Austronesian origin in Southeast Asia. From the 2nd to the mid-15th century the Chams populated Champa, a contiguous territory of independent principalities in central and southern Vietnam. They spoke the Cham language, and also the Tsat language by their descendants called Utsul in Hainan island, China, two Chamic languages from Malayo-Polynesian group of the Austronesian family.
