The Whiskey Rebellion (also known as the Whiskey Insurrection) was a tax protest in the United States beginning in 1791 and ending in 1794 during the presidency of George Washington, ultimately under the command of American Revolutionary war veteran Major James McFarlane. The so-called "whiskey tax" was the first tax imposed on a domestic product by the newly formed federal government.

The Whiskey Rebellion—George Washington, Alexander—

When the U.S. government sent tax collectors west, farmers grabbed their muskets to defend their rights. At one point, an armed mob of 7,000 people marched in Pittsburgh.

Washington took full notice of the Whiskey Rebellion in western Pennsylvania, Maryland and Virginia and decided that only a strong show of force.would alleviate the problem. By means of volunteering and conscription, Washington organized a 13,000 man Army and then personally lead them across Pennsylvania to put down the insurrection.

George Washington and the Whiskey Rebellion—Owlicaton—

Many of the Founders, including George Washington, believed that one weakness of the Articles of Confederation was that the federal government could not deal firmly with domestic uprisings such as Shay's Rebellion. George Washington, always aware that as the new nation's first President, his every action would be "drawn into precedent," conducted himself both deliberately and decisively when farmers across the US resisted a new federal excise tax on liquor.
